n 2030, 60% of the world's population will live in cities. The consequences of this rapid urbanization are social (growth of precarious settlements, increased risks of social fragmentation and poverty), economic (concentration of unemployed populations and difficulties in access to economic opportunities), and environmental (urban sprawl and increasing climate vulnerability). Cities will need to be able to deal with this urban growth and its consequences.

Faced with these challenges, AFD provides support for the low-carbon transition in cities and their adaptation to climate change. It seeks to improve quality of life for city dwellers and supports sustainable development of territories. It helps stakeholders in cities to take up the challenges of urban growth, social inequalities, and urban areas' vulnerability.

For a comprehensive view of AFD's actions regarding sustainable cities, activity reports from other entities in the AFD Group are also available. In addition to urban development and support for local authorities, AFD Group works on such issues as water and sanitation in cities, urban transportation and mobility, energy activities in cities, and private-sector sustainable city activities (via Proparco). In 2022, AFD approved a total of more than  $\notin$ 3 billion of financing for sustainable cities.

# AFD's Sustainable Cities Strategy

Support and financing for the development of sustainable cities

AFD provides cities with support for taking up the challenges of urban growth, social and territorial inequalities, and vulnerability of urban areas. It promotes sustainable cities as a process of design, building and management, by working with local decision-makers authorities in charge of cities, civil society, and city dwellers.





## **Improving climate resilience** and low-carbon transition in cities


AFD works towards mitigation and adaptation, providing support for governments and local authorities using various levers:

- → Adopting an incentive framework to encourage strategies and actions in response to the challenges of climate change
- → Searching for dense urban forms and improving energy efficiency in buildings
- → Encouraging resilient urban development (prevention/management of risks of natural disaster, promoting biodiversity in the city and Nature-based Solutions)
- → **Promoting** projects for the reduction of greenhouse gas emissions
- → Supporting local authorities as motors of low-carbon transitions
- → Mobilizing dedicated funds and tools to identify and design urban projects with climate co-benefits

#### **Breakdown by region**







In the coming years, AFD's commitments in the sector of urban development and support for local authorities **in 2022** will enable:

## Improving quality of life for city dwellers

Projects to improve the quality of life of city dwellers accounted for nearly **20%** of financing in the sector in 2022.

The challenge is to put city dwellers back at the heart of urban strategies, and to consider their needs more effectively by supporting actions that improve access to essential urban services and sectors that are increasingly in demand:

- → Improving access to basic urban services (access to drinking water, sanitation, public lighting, transportation and mobility services, etc.)
- → **Reducing** the environmental and health impact of solid waste in cities
- → Developing access to housing and improving housing conditions
- → Supporting access to employment and local economic development

## Turkey

Sewage sludge recovery by the municipality

#### €60 M - AFD non-sovereign loan

AFD is assisting the Antalya Municipal Water and Sanitation Authority with a project to recover energy from sewage sludge and extend a wastewater treatment plant. The objective is to reduce the carbon footprint of the service by generating energy from a new sludgeto-energy recovery unit. It will also improve access to efficient and sustainable sanitation services for residents, by increasing the treatment capacity of the Lara plant and protecting the environment.

## Brazil

Green, resilient and inclusive regeneration of Porto Alegre



**€52 M** - sovereign loan **€ 500,000** - technical assistance grant

Alongside the World Bank, AFD is supporting the urban revitalization of the central area of Porto Alegre. It is based on a long-term development vision of the municipality, forged through a participatory process. The objective is to contribute to a resilient and inclusive regeneration. The project comprises financing for priority infrastructure to improve disaster resilience, mobility, public spaces and landmark historical buildings, as well as institutional capacity building for the municipality. It also includes activities to increase the social and economic inclusion of disadvantaged and vulnerable groups.

# **Strengthening local authorities** local actors in charge of the city

In 2022, 47% of the commitments aimed primarily at strengthening local actors in charge of the city.

AFD helps guide all the stakeholders involved in urban projects and supports local authorities as key players in territorial development, in two wavs:

- → Supporting decentralization processes
- → Supporting local authorities for their investment programs and access to financing

## Tunisia

AFD is financing the municipal development support project of the National Federation of Tunisian Municipalities (FNCT), implemented by Expertise France. It is working with both the FNCT to develop its services to municipalities (gender-sensitive budgeting in particular), and directly with pilot municipalities for technical assistance (planning) and target projects (innovative projects for local development and local public services).

#### AFD in Overseas France A major lender for the local public sector

AFD is one of the leading funders (and a longstanding funder) of local authorities and operators in Overseas France, alongside Caisse des Dépôts et Consignations. AFD provides direct budget loans to local authorities to finance their investment programs, and it finances projects run by housing and development operators. It is also reinforcing its role as advisor and technical partner of local authorities, particularly on climate issues.

# Urban sports facilities

Focus on

Sport is a driver for the fulfillment of the 2030 Agenda, contributing to the achievement of a number of SDGs, including SDG 11. AFD supports the implementation of "Sport for All" strategies promoting equal access to sports activities, with a focus on gender equality and providing a response to the aspirations of young people. It finances community sports facilities to develop access to sport and improve the quality of services and their management.

## Senegal

#### **Dakar Youth Olympic Games**

#### €45 M - sovereign loan AFD

AFD is financing the rehabilitation of sports facilities to prepare for the 2026 Youth Olympic Games. The project will reduce inequalities in access to sports facilities and promote sports activities. The program includes the complete renovation of three major public facilities (stadium, swimming pool, horse-riding center) and the construction of community facilities. It will also define a sustainable strategy for equipment management and



maintenance, and implement an action plan to increase sports activities for women and persons with reduced mobility.

## Urban Innovation Laboratories




These development accelerators strengthen the Sustainable Cities strategy. Civil society and city residents should be involved in the construction of the city and the urban project. It is important to meet the needs of city users while long-term urban projects are underway, by designing actions that quickly test urban planning, new uses, and new forms of citizen participation.



**€5 M** of multi-country financing was approved in 2022 to provide further financing to the participatory urban planning initiative: the **"Urban Fabric"** program which supports rapidly implemented microprojects led by residents.

#### Trend since 2017






Total amount of financing agreements signed in 2022 in the urban development and local government support sector

## **Results achieved**

In **2022**, the ongoing projects in urban development and support for local authorities enabled:

# Funds for preparing projects

With the support of other donors and partners, AFD has established several regional and sectoral funds for project preparation. These funds finance feasibility studies and technical assistance to prepare future urban investment projects that provide climate benefits.



In 2022, AFD allocated a **€3 million** grant to top up **the CICLIA - Cities and Climate in Africa facility**, dedicated to the preparation of climate projects in African cities.

### **Sustainable Housing Initiative**



AFD launched this multi-country facility in 2021 to facilitate access to affordable, decent and sustainable housing. With a financial budget currently standing at €3.2 million, this initiative aims to support the implementation of public policies for sustainable housing through sectoral technical assistance to public entities in charge of housing at the national and local levels.

## **Knowledge production**



→ AFD's knowledge production in the urban sector has focused on nature in cities with the publication of a "<u>Biodiversity in Cities</u>" technical guide.

- → AFD organized an international conference (scientific analyses, practices) along with geographical versions
- → With the World Bank, the City of Paris and Expertise France, AFD co-organized a training workshop in Paris for representatives of cities in AFD's countries of operation.



#### **Events**

AFD took part in several major events devoted to sustainable cities, such

as the World Urban Forum in Katowice, Poland (organized by UN-Habitat), the Africities Summit in Kisumu, Kenya (organized by United Cities and Local Governments of Africa), and the COP27 climate summit in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt.
