Crisis and Recovery Calls for Projects

The CRCP (Crisis and Recovery Calls for Projects) is a grant tool for CSOs (civil society organizations). It aims to finance projects submitted during the year, excluding initial programming, in response to a crisis situation.

Financed by AFD, on behalf of the French State, the CRCP is the main operational tool for financing projects carried out by non-public actors.



Objectives

Finance recovery and/or delivery of basic services in crisis, post-crisis or post-disaster contexts.

On the basis of a call for projects launched by AFD, CSOs/non-profit organizations submit projects:

- Aimed at strengthening resilience and capacity in the medium term, as well as local equipment and infrastructure
- Developed in accordance with the national policies of the country of operation and implemented with the competent public institutions and local associations
- For which they ensure the project management



Beneficiaries

French CSOs recognized for their know-how, their knowledge of the areas concerned, and the strength of local partnerships developed

International CSOs

Non-profit organizations

Examples of countries benefiting from past crisis calls for projects (2020, 2021, 2022): Burkina Faso, Central African Republic, Chad, Colombia, Ecuador, Jordan, Lebanon and Niger



Characteristics

Type of instrument: Grant

Format: Calls for projects for a specific country with predefined amounts

Operation: Co-construction of projects with CSOs or other French and international non-profit organizations

Eligibility criteria: States having experienced a crisis or disaster in the 12 months preceding the grant, or experiencing chronic or prolonged crisis situations; the CRCP can be launched in areas not covered by the Minka initiatives (see Minka sheet)

The standard duration of projects funded under a CRCP is between 18 and 48 months



Examples

Chad (€22 M): In the provinces of Eastern Logone, Mandoul, Ouaddaï and Wadi Fira, grants for projects to improve the level of education and empowerment of the most vulnerable, particularly girls and out-of-school children in rural areas.



Lebanon (€11 M): In the sensitive urban districts of Greater Beirut, Tripoli and Saida, implementation of a program to develop access to local services, for more social cohesion and less gender inequality.
