n 2030, 60% of the world's population will live in cities. The consequences of this rapid urbanization are social (including growth of precarious settlements, increased risks of social fragmentation and poverty), economic (difficulties accessing economic opportunities and concentration of unemployment), and environmental (urban sprawl and increasing climate vulnerability).

AFD helps cities cope with this urban growth and its impact by supporting their low-carbon transition and their adaptation to climate change. AFD's goals are to improve the quality of life for city dwellers and to boost sustainable local development. To do so, it helps people take up the challenges of urban growth, social inequality, and the vulnerability of their cities.

The year 2023 saw a sharp increase in our commitments in the Balkans, Asia and the Middle East via sovereign loans, as well as (but to a lesser extent) in Africa through grants and loans. The 2023 financing has served to bolster the technical and/or financial capacities of many cities and other entities in the urban sector (around 460 worldwide).

AFD committed a total of nearly €3 billion in financing for sustainable cities in 2023

For a comprehensive view of AFD's actions regarding sustainable cities, activity reports from other entities in AFD Group are also available. In addition to urban development and support for local authorities. AFD Group works on such issues as water and sanitation in cities, urban transportation and mobility, energy activities in cities, and private-sector sustainable city activities (via Proparco).

Support and financing for the development of sustainable cities

AFD provides cities with support for taking up the challenges of urban growth, social and territorial inequalities, and the vulnerability of urban areas. AFD promotes sustainable cities as a process of design, building and management, by working with local authorities, other local actors, civil society and city dwellers.





Improving climate resilience and low-carbon transitions in cities

AFD promotes climate-change mitigation and adaptation, by providing support to central governments and local authorities using various modes of leverage:

- → Adopting an incentive framework to boost → Promoting projects that reduce greenhouse strategies and actions in response to the challenges of climate change
- → Searching for improved urban density and energy efficiency in buildings
- → Encouraging resilient urban development (natural disaster prevention and risk management, biodiversity in the city, and nature-based solutions)

What did Proparco do in 2023?

Proparco, AFD Group's subsidiary dedicated to the private sector, has committed approximately €100 M to support private stakeholders in urban development. In 2023, for example. Proparco initiated two projects in South Africa to build and retrofit rental housing that is affordable, well located and energy-efficient. It has teamed up with South African investment manager 27four to acquire a €20 M stake in *Divercity* Urban Property Group. Proparco has also provided a €10 M credit line in local currency to TUHF Limited, a non-bank financial institution that supports small-scale entrepreneurs






Trends in commitments (in € M)

Improve quality of life for city dwellers

In 2023, nearly 42% of our urban development financing went to re-establishing city dwellers as the focus of urban strategies and to improve access to essential urban services.

Meeting city dwellers' needs (public lighting, waste management, housing, jobs, etc.):

- Improving access to basic urban services (access to drinking water, sanitation, public lighting, transportation and mobility services, etc.)

Improving infrastructure and city governance

AFD is mobilizing financing for a national results-based program targeting 86 cities, dedicated to infrastructure improvement (in quality, access, resilience and gender sensitivity) and to city governance (especially for more inclusive cities). This project is co-financed by the Asian Development Bank, which, in addition to a \$300 M loan, is managing a €2 M technical assistance grant. This financing also contributes to Strategic Objective 3 "strengthen local stakeholders".

Promoting sustainable urban development

AFD has devoted 17% of urban development financing to sustainability, with action targeted at the local level.

AFD is continuing its support for PADEVE, a project run by the Ministry of Decentralization and Regional Planning. This second phase involves support for six cities to deal with their expansion (Antsirabe, Fianarantsoa, Toliara, Mahajanga, Diego and Toamasina - average population 200,000). They will benefit from rehabilitation or construction of urban infrastructure such as roads, markets, drainage canals, public gardens, and essential services. PADEVE's actions will take climate actions into account in that work, and they will increase the cities' capacity for action.

Strengthening local authorities in charge of the city

By 2023, 42% of financing focused on strengthening local actors in urban development. AFD supports local authorities as key players in regional development.

AFD is supporting the City of Bogota by financing part of its 2020-2024 development plan, especially in the areas of gender equality (the main crosscutting objective) and social inclusion, climate-change adaptation, and access to sustainable mobility.

AFD finances local authorities in Overseas France

(e.g. €30 M for French Guiana in 2023)

AFD is one of the leading sources of financing for local authorities and operators in Overseas France, alongside Caisse des Dépôts et Consignations. In 2023, for example, it supported the Territorial Collectivity of French Guiana (population 300,000) via a €30 M budget loan for its investment program devoted especially to infrastructure in education, transport, and digital networks. Support in these areas has become essential to keep pace with demographic growth. AFD is also boosting its role as advisor to and technical partner of local authorities, particularly on climate-change issues.

Sports and culture in cities

AFD finances local sports facilities to develop access to sports and improve the quality of the sports offer and management. We also finance cultural facilities such as museums and strive to reconcile preservation of cultural heritage (including historic districts) with the enhancement of the city's attractiveness over the long term.

Funds for project preparation

AFD has set up several https://www.afd.fr/fr/ les-fonds-de-preparation-de-projets with partner support. These funds are designed to finance feasibility studies and technical assistance to prepare future urban investment projects.

The Swiss State Secretariat for Economic Affairs (SECO) delegated €3 M to AFD in 2023 for the CICLIA (Cities and Climate in Africa) facility. CICLIA is dedicated to projects to fight climate-change impact in African cities. AFD had allocated a €3 M grant to top up CICLIA in 2022.





The European Union delegated €5 M to AFD for Phase 3 of the Urban Projects Finance Initiative (UPFI), a facility for preparing sustainable urban projects. It targets cities and States in the five countries of the European Union's eastern neighborhood (Armenia, Azerbaijan, Georgia, Moldova, and Ukraine).






The Cityriz guarantee program encourages banks to finance the climate co-benefit projects of African cities and their operators. As part of this program, AFD manages a €2 M technical assistance budget financed by the European Union. AFD helps local authorities in the technical and financial preparation of their resilient infrastructure projects, and it supports the banks that lend to them by bolstering their risk-analysis procedures.

Trend since 2018





Green City: developing and protecting the lagoon area

By combining urban planning, creation of public spaces, and flood flood risk management, this project contributes to greater resilience to climate change in Benin's capital. In addition, two decentralized cooperation projects with Greater Lyon and the Urban Community of Cergy-Pontoise have provided technical support. Among other benefits, the projects included the development and environmental protection of lagoon banks and precarious neighborhoods, support for income-generating activities, renovation of traditional town squares, and technical and institutional support for municipal services

Knowledge production and partnerships









AFD's knowledge production in the urban sector has focused on housing especially. With funding from the Sustainable Housing Initiative (SHI), we conducted a study on how affordable housing contributes to achieving to the various SDGs. A summary report of the study, which was based on scientific literature, has been published. Meanwhile, the year was rich in training courses provided by AFD experts on sustainable cities. The training targeted solid waste management, decentralization (with Campus France in Marseilles), and "Cities and Climate" (in Mombasa, Kenya), for example.

Events and partnerships

AFD took part in a number of major events devoted to sustainable cities, including the **UN-Habitat** General Assembly in Kenya — with which we signed a partnership agreement and the Summit for a New Global Financing Pact conference on financing sustainable cities, held at UNESCO in Paris, AFD also participated in the second session of the Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee to develop an international treaty on plastic pollution.

We also spoke on the subject of waste management at the COP28 Climate Conference in Dubai. Additionally, we are continuing to build on our knowledge about intermediate cities, having taken part in a research seminar organized by the French Institute of International Relations (Ifri).
